A change in the booklet has been completed this year. This process will continue until the Booklet appears to be at its best. Please note the changes made this year are to eliminate some problems of past years in completing the entry forms.

Adult Tag: Complete fully the Department, Class, and Sub-class of your entry at the top and the entry number and your name at the bottom.

Youth Tag: Complete fully the Department, Section, Class, and Sub-class of your entry at the top and the entry number and your name at the bottom.

The booklet continues to list the youth and adult together. Hopefully at this point the booklet has become more user friendly. Also the cost of printing the booklet continues to increase which causes a strain on the budget. It is good business to utilize the funds wisely that is available to the Hollidaysburg Community Farm Show from the State Fair Funds.

Please read the booklet carefully when completing the entry tags.

Some entries remain the same as previous years while others have been dropped or added. The use of colored entry tags remains the same. (Yellow tag for Youth / White tag for Adult / Orange tag for Contests)

Youth is considered to be anyone under 19 years and a High School student.

Be sure the right tag is used. Yellow for Youth. White for Adults. Orange for Contests.

Note: The use of an orange tag will be for contest entries. See committee members for instructions.

- All entries are free. 2.
- 3. Each entrant must secure entry card for each exhibit.
- The management reserves the right to accept or refuse any and all entries. Entrants will se-4. cure an exhibitor's number and then will be instructed how to make entries.
- Articles which have previously won premiums at this show will not be accepted for competi-5 tion again, (Articles **must** be made by Entrant.)
- Entries may be entered on Monday, September 18, 2023, from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. and 6 on Tuesday, September 19, 2023, from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. (All entries must be made by Tuesday, September 19, 2023 at 10:00 a.m.)
- Judging Exhibits will start at 1:00 p.m. September 19, 2023. 7.
- Entries shall be the product of the exhibitor. 8.
- Antigues and Novelties may be exhibited but will not be judged in competition nor prizes awarded. 9.
- 10. An entrant is discouraged to enter more than one entry in each class or sub-class. Only one prize can be awarded.
- 11. If an exhibit is improperly entered, the judges may re-enter it and judge it in the proper class.
- 12. No award shall be made in any case unless the exhibit is worthy. In case of no competition the judges may award a lower prize than 1st place at his or her discretion.
- 13. The record of the secretary shall be the final evidence for awards.
- 14. 1st, 2nd, and 3rd prizes will be awarded for all classes and sub-classes except as noted.
- 15. All exhibits will be entered in open competition.
- 16. The Show Committee will afford all possible protection for exhibits but will not be responsible for losses.
- 17. Exhibits may **NOT** be removed until Thursday Evening, September 21, 2023, at 8:00 p.m. or Friday Morning September 22, 2023, 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. All things not picked up on Friday, September 22, 2023 become the property of Farm Show.
- 18. Exhibits will be released at the close of the show by presentation of stubs or by other means of identification satisfactory to the Committee.
- 19. All receipts of the show must go into the Farm Show Fund unless otherwise designated by the directors.
- 20. All premiums will be paid by check. The checks must be presented for payment within ninety (90) days from the date thereon.
- 21. All booth exhibits should be of uniform size 3 feet deep and 3 feet wide.

BAKED GOODS:

- 1. Exhibits must be made and owned by exhibitor.
- 2. Do not use Commercial Mix.
- 3. Breads are to be Fork marked.
- 4. Display in baggies.
- 5. Due to the concern that any entry may spoil borders on being wasteful and very costly to the entrant, each entry **may** become the property of the Hollidaysburg Community Farm Show. All items must be placed in/on disposable containers. After judging is completed a sample will be held for display **and if approved by the entrant the remaining portion will be sold** during the bake sale or it will be available to the entrant for their own use. A Tag will be available to note your choice. The Farm Show will not be responsible for containers that are not disposable.
- 6. The Bake Goods Sale will begin after Judging on Tuesday of the show week.

CANNED OR DRIED PRODUCTS:

- 1. Exhibits must be prepared by entrant.
- 2. Canned foods to be judged on quality, general appearance, and container.
- 3. Use standard mason-type, clear guart/pint only glass jars for preserving and exhibiting fruits, vegetables and meats. Do not remove rings on jars; use new rings.
- 4. Use two-piece self-sealing lids (flat discs and metal screw bands) for sealing all jars of food.
- 5. All food not in standard jars or not sealed with self-sealing lids will be disgualified by the Judge.
- 6. Container will be opened on jams, jellies, preserves, marmalade & pickles.

JELLIES, PRESERVES AND BUTTERS

- 1. Exhibits must be prepared by entrant.
- 2. Canned foods to be judged on quality, general appearance, and container.
- 3. Use standard mason-type, clear 1/2 pint or pint jars for preserving and exhibiting jellies, preserves, and butters.
- 4. Use two-piece self-sealing lids (flat discs and metal screw bands) for sealing all jars of food.
- 5. All food not in standard jars or not sealed with self-sealing lids will be disgualified by the judge. 6. Containers may be opened.
- **DFPARTMENT 17**
- Rule F Page 5 Floral 1. All exhibits for competition must have been grown by the entrant except those used in the arrangement classes. All arrangements must be arranged by the entrant.
- 2. Entrants must furnish own containers. Use containers that won't tip over. No paper cups.
- 3. House plants must have been the property of the entrant at least three months prior to the time of entry and grown in the pots in which they are entered.
- 4. No entry may be entered in more than one class. Entrants may enter as many classes including sub-classes as they desire. Duplicate entries not accepted.
- 5. Any entry not meeting the requirements will be disqualified.
- 6. By definition
 - A bloom is an individual flower (1 bloom on a stem)
 - A stem is a portion of a plant with a number of flowers (more than 1 bloom on a stem)
 - A spike is a thick stem carrying many florets

HOUSE PLANTS

- 1. Only one species per pot except in collection classes.
- 2. Pots are not to exceed 10 inches in diameter or 10 inches in width. (The pot must pass through a 10 inch circle if round or a 10 inch square if not round)

SPECIMEN FLOWERS

- 1. Entries must be cut flowers grown by the exhibitor and must conform to the number of blooms, stems, or spikes specified in each class.
- 2. The uniformity of height, color, or size is an important factor in evaluating entries.
- 3. Flowers in each entry must be of one color and variety unless otherwise stated.

ARTISTIC ARRANGEMENTS

1. Fresh or Dried flowers are acceptable in all entries except Class 81

DEPARTMENT 18

CLOTHING

- 1. An entry is to consist of one garment.
- 2. Each entry will be judged on material, design suitability, and workmanship.
- 3. All articles of clothing must have been made by the exhibitor since the close of last year's farm show. No repeat entries accepted.
- 4. Items must not be soiled.

NEEDLEWORK

- 1. All needlework articles must have been made by the entrant within the last year except rugs, quilts, and bedspreads.
- 2. Exhibits are to be shown one time. No repeats from previous year(s).

DEPARTMENT 19

- Arts, Crafts, and Photography 1. Paintings are not to exceed 20 inches by 20 inches including frame.
- 2. All entries must be the work of the exhibitor.
- 3. All entries are to be 4" x 6" minimum or 11" x 14" maximum **mounted on mat board**.

Group Exhibits

Major Contests

- 4. Limit one entry per Sub-Class.
- 5. Glass in frames will be accepted but the Farm Show will not be responsible if broken.

- 3. Entire entry must be **made from scratch**. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.) All ingredients and decorations must be edible.
- 4. Cake recipe **must feature chocolate or cocoa** as a main ingredient.
- 5. Entry must be a layered chocolate cake.
- 6. Entry **must be frosted** and frosting must also be made from "scratch" (no pre-packaged frosting).
- 7. The entire cake entry must be submitted for judging **on cardboard or other food** safe disposable setting. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
- 8. Recipes must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of $8-1/2^{"} \times 11^{"}$ paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, guantities, and the preparation instructions. Entrant's name, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and cakes will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
- 9. Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.

The goal of the PA Preferred[®] Baking Contest is to encourage young people across the Commonwealth to participate in Pennsylvania's agricultural fairs by showcasing Pennsylvania grown and produced products in their contest entries.

RULES:

- 1. Open to any individual **amateur** baker (ages 8 through 18 at the time of the fair's contest) who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
- 2. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this PA Preferred[®] Junior Baking contest at any other fair in 2023.
- 3. Entry must be **six (6) individual sized portions** of the baked entry item (cookies, brownies or bars).
- 4. Entire entry must **be made from scratch**. <u>No</u> pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.). <u>All ingredients and decorations must be edible</u>.
- 5. At least two (2) PA Preferred[®] or locally purchased ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (*such as oats or flour*), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
- 6. **A PA Preferred® logo is <u>not</u> required** because not all PA Preferred® products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient (see attached example). Contact RA-AGPAPreferred@pa.gov for any assistance with qualifying ingredients.
- 7. Entry must be submitted for judging **on a food safe disposable setting**. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will <u>not</u> be returned.)
- 8. Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2" x 11" paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. **The name** of each PA Preferred® ingredient or locally purchased ingredient must be clearly listed clearly along with the source that made/grew the product (ex: PA Preferred Milk – Galliker's brand or Apples - Smith Farm Orchard). Entrant's name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and cookies-brownies-bars will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
- Refrigeration is <u>not</u> available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.

INSTRUCTIONS TO BE USED BY FAIRS AT THEIR 2023 EVENT - Each county/local fair is encouraged to conduct a 35th Annual Blue Ribbon Apple Pie Contest at their 2023 event. Listed

below are the criteria which we would like each fair to use in their contest. The certified first place winner from each fair will then have the opportunity to enter an apple pie in the BLUE RIBBON APPLE PIE CONTEST at the 2024 PENNSYLVANIA FARM SHOW.

<u>RULES</u> for local Fair and the PA Farm Show contests are as follows:

- 1. Open to any individual **amateur** baker who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
- 2. Entrants may <u>NOT</u> have won 1st place in this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest at any other fair in 2023.
- 3. Entire entry must be **made from scratch**. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (*ex: pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.*) All ingredients and decorations **must be edible.**
- 4. Recipe **must include at least 60% apples in the filling**. It does not need to be a "traditional" two crusted apple pie and it can have a variety of fillings.
- 5. The entire pie must be submitted for judging in a food safe disposable pie pan. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
- 6. The recipe for the pie and pie crust must be submitted with the entry. It should be submitted on one side of 8 ½" by 11" paper. The recipe must list all the ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. Entrant's name, address and phone number must be printed on the <u>back side</u> of all the pages. (All recipes and pies will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
- 7. Refrigeration is <u>not</u> available at the Fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.
- 8. Judging will be based on the following criteria:

Creativity is essential to a varied competition. Do not limit your contest to a "traditional" two-crusted apple pie. We are looking for a variety of fillings in the pies; the pie must include <u>at least 60% apples</u> in the filling.

The recipe for the pie and pie crust will also need to be submitted when entering at the Penn-sylvania Farm Show.

Each Fair must submit the Contest Summary Report verifying the winning apple pie baker. This person will then be eligible to enter the state competition at the 2024 PA Farm Show and will receive the Official Certification Form from the PA Fairs Special Baking Contest Committee.

<u>NOTE</u>: If an individual has already won 1st place at another fair in 2023 for this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest, that individual is now considered qualified through that Fair to compete at the 2024 PA Farm Show and is no longer eligible to enter this contest at any upcoming Fairs.
